# **I never thought it would happen to me!**

Being robbed isn't the best of experiences. When listening to other people's stories, I never considered it would happen to me. After all, we live in sleepy ol' Carlton.

Early one morning in May this year I was alerted by a neighbour telling me that my car was open and had been for some time. I wandered into the road to find my car very open and the contents all gone! Reality sinking in; the sick feeling in the stomach. OMG!!

I suspect my car was opened electronically, all of the contents stolen, computers and documents locked in the boot for an important board meeting that morning had been swiped, gone, lifted, pinched - not there anymore. Was the car locked? Yes, as I am conscientious about locking it up. Last thing the previous night I had loaded my car for an early set off to South Yorkshire, never considering what might happen during the night. Foolish? In hindsight, probably. Unreasonable? Not really. I had done the same thing for the last 5 years - every second Tuesday in the month a board meeting - so, load the car last thing, leave early, beat the traffic.

I called the Police from my mobile phone using the 101 service which was a mistake. If you do use the 101 number call from a landline, it connects in a few seconds instead of 5 minutes. You will be encouraged to report the car theft or car crime online, but if you use your mobile you may have to wait up to 35 minutes before the automated voice tells you to do this. Call from a land line - it is very much quicker. Reporting a crime online is quick and easy, after which you will be able to get on with dealing with the aftermath. Do not expect the flying squad for a minor crime - it doesn't work like that. The Police have a heavy workload and after all, no-one had been injured and my belongings were long gone. It did take a while for a face to face meeting with a policeman, but they were very good and above all interested!

We were lucky to have a CCTV recording of the crime in real time. A scary piece of footage shows the hooded sticky-fingered thief wearing oversized sunglasses and a hoody in my car at 1.44 am. It took just 90 seconds to empty my car. The footage showed the robber's car registration number, which led to the arrest of 3 individuals by Staffordshire Police some weeks later, and the car being impounded following several similar local crimes and sightings. So, it could happen to you, and if it does it will be a horrible experience. In the case of a computer, the cost of a new one is insignificant when compared with the costs arising from the loss of the information in the stolen one.

Some personal advice: lock your car; do not leave belongings in it; use a Defender Pouch (£2.50 from Hinckley Police Station or Carlton Fete); join the Carlton Neighbourhood Watch Group; follow the Carlton Villagers Facebook page; keep your eyes peeled; report anything suspicious; be neighbourly; look out for each other.

If you are in danger or a crime is in progress ring 999 and you will get a fast response. Otherwise report the crime on-line, or on 101 using a landline, and you will get a response after a few days.

## **Defibrillator - Volunteer Needed**

Unfortunately, one of our volunteer couples has left the village and we now seek a replacement. To be a volunteer all you need is a broadband connection for the emergency phone. The First Responders will provide you with the necessary training for CPR and using the defibrillator.

Please contact me if you would like to help. You are unlikely to be called but if you are you may save a life. If you are new to the village, you should put the emergency number (056 0368 0268) into your phone. If anyone suffers a cardiac arrest you only have 8 minutes to restart the heart before there is irreversible brain damage.

## **Speed and traffic monitoring**

Our Speed Indicator Device (SID) was monitoring vehicles heading into the village at the western end of Main Street from 9<sup>th</sup> April to 13<sup>th</sup> May. During this period 20,335 vehicles were counted. The average number of vehicles per day was 719 on weekdays, and 683 during the week as a whole. The average speed was 23.2 mph, and the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed was 29.5 mph. The highest speed recorded was 50.0 mph at 16:25 hrs on 11<sup>th</sup> April.

The SID was moved to the bottom of Bosworth Road on 27<sup>th</sup> May, and remained there until 15<sup>th</sup> July. During this period 41,484 vehicles were counted heading into the village. The average number of vehicles per day was 1014 on weekdays, and 944 during the week as a whole. The average speed was 33.8 mph, and the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed was 44.2 mph. The highest speed recorded was 85.0 mph at 22:20 hrs on 31<sup>st</sup> May.

### **NHW National Update**

Leicestershire Trading Standards is warning about firms overcharging for services which can be applied for directly. These firms generally operate online and are known as copycat websites: they often charge for a service you can get for free or at a much lower cost on the genuine site. Sometimes they take an exorbitant cut of a refund, but this detail is hidden in small print and you only realise when it is too late. Examples are European Health Insurance Cards, tax refunds, passports, visas & driving licences which can all be accessed legitimately through [www.gov.uk](http://www.gov.uk)

## **More on Bosworth Road signage**

Changes are to be made to the highway signs at the southern end of Bosworth Road. There will be two *Carlton* village nameplates, one on each side of the road, on the Bosworth side of Park View Farm, followed by five advance warning bars painted across the road. The *dragon's teeth* markings and *30 roundel* will remain, and there will be thick white lines on each side of the road at the 30 mph signs. The aim of these changes is to give an earlier indication of the start of the residential area, and to create an enclosing effect to encourage drivers heading into the village to slow down. County Highways has kindly agreed to implement these changes without charge.

Having rejected proposals to introduce a 40 mph speed limit (see last issue), the Parish Council asked for 3, 2, 1 warning signs to be installed in advance of the 30 mph speed limit. This request was refused by County Highways because these signs are only authorised for use at level crossings. The Parish Council then asked for signs advising that there is a 30 mph speed limit 150 yds ahead. This request was also refused because these signs are non-standard.

It is frustrating that the 30 mph signs on the other approaches to the village are located before the first houses, yet this cannot be achieved on the road with the most serious speeding problem.

Most frustrating of all is the fact that most drivers are local residents, and that if they would only observe the sensible speed limits of 30 mph through residential areas a lot of time, effort and money could be saved, and possibly also a few lives.
