Retrospective applications will be considered for expenditure that has been incurred since the Trustees' previous meeting, in this case, 18th November 2020.

Carlton Charity Lands distributes the annual rental income from two fields in the Parish of Carlton in the form of financial assistance to young people at the early stages of their careers. Successful applicants must provide proof of purchase or costs incurred before monies are released. When an award is made, the applicant may not apply for another award until twelve months have elapsed from the date of the initial award.

As the next meeting takes place after the start of the forthcoming educational year, the Trustees are looking forward to receiving many applications. Please stay safe and take care during these difficult times.

In April, Bill Sharp, Chair of Carlton Parochial Church Council (PCC), signed the building contract for the Hub with Ackroyd Construction. Ackroyds are expert in working with historic buildings. They expect to start work early in July, subject to obtaining the building materials.

AR Demolition, our local supporters, will work with Ackroyds to provide the groundworks for the foundations and water and waste pipe connections. Ackroyds expect to complete the building work in November 2021. We will then need to furnish the Hub before holding an opening event, hopefully before Christmas.

An New Elm Tree in Carlton

An English elm tree (*Ulmus minor var vulgaris* 'Upper Swell' = *U. procera*) has been planted just inside the Carlton Parish boundary at the side of the footpath between Saint Andrew's Church and Barton in the Beans, by kind permission of the landowner. Our hope is that this tree will establish and make a significant contribution to the local landscape as it grows and matures.

The planted sapling elm was micro-propagated from a tree in the Gloucestershire village of Upper Swell which had not been affected by Dutch Elm Disease. The pot-grown sapling was kindly donated to Carlton Parish Council by Goscote Nurseries, Syston Road, Cossington. This nursery carries a very good stock of ornamental and fruit trees and is well worth a visit.

English Elms are impressively rough and rangy trees, living for 250-300 years and growing 30m tall with a girth up to 7m. They were a major feature of the local landscape until almost all were killed by Dutch Elm Disease which took hold in the late 1960's. There

were once many elm trees in Carlton village, and at one time Main Street was informally known as Butt Lane because of the many stumps of felled elm trees along it. This was before infill development had taken place between Hall Terrace and Barton Road.

Carlton Parish Council tried to save a splendid elm tree at the corner of Main Street and Bosworth Road by pumping a fungicide into the trunk, but the treatment did not work. I remember the late Tony Cooper (PC Chairman 1968-91) telling me that they pumped until liquid squirted out of the ends of the branches, but to no avail.

Elm trees have always been closely associated with human settlements, and 'elm' is one of the commonest components of Anglo-Saxon place names. English Elm trees rarely produce viable seed in our current cool climate, and usually grow up from suckers. Elm is still very common in local hedgerows, but the plants are susceptible to Dutch Elm Disease and if allowed to grow up they become infected and die back when the trunks achieve a diameter of about 150mm. Spring Clean Litter Pick – 21st March 2021

This event was exceptionally well supported. 41 volunteers managed to clear the roads between Carlton and Market Bosworth, the Marina, Congerstone, Barton in the Beans and Osbaston as well as Gibbet Lane. We collected more than two cubic metres of rubbish, mainly bottles, cans and food packaging, although spent gun cartridges, tyres, a smashed cathode ray TV tube, a Sat-nav and bedding added to the variety.

The world is getting smaller

Some time ago Chris Peat forwarded an email from someone called Athos in Greece, who had read the Carlton PC website and was interested in the Goddard and Oldacres families. We sent him some details and the family trees which my brother had produced, and it transpired we are related to him. It turned out that Athos was the great-great-grandson of George Hollis who lived in Carlton from 1920 to 1964, most of that time at the Fernlea Plant Nursery on Barton Road. In the early fifties my family lived on Nailstone Road opposite George's house on Barton Road, and my sister, brother and myself used to play with George's grandchildren when they visited. Athos's grandmother is still alive, and we have now communicated and shared our memories of those days.

The Greek connection comes about because Athos's grandmother was a doctor in London and married a Greek surgeon. Athos has worked out from the Oldacres connection we are 4th cousins but that is not surprising: if you are from a longstanding Carlton family you most likely are related to the Oldacres family, closely followed by the Goddard family. I have also sent Athos a greetings card sent by his great-great-grandmother to my mother when one of her children was born.

Neighbourhood Watch National Update

NHW continue their warnings against cyber based crime. There has been a 93% increase in the use of spyware and stalkerware apps in the UK since lockdown measures were first introduced. Stalkerware is unethical software that allows people to track someone's location, without the victim's knowledge or consent. Stalkerware gives the perpetrator access to a victim's personal photos, videos, emails, texts and app communications such as WhatsApp and Facebook, as well as eavesdropping on phone calls and making covert recordings of conversations over the internet.

Stalkerware is a form of technology abuse. Usually installed secretly on mobile phones by so-called friends, jealous spouses and ex-partners, stalkerware tracks the physical location of the victim, monitors sites visited, phone calls and text messages, undermining a person's online freedom and individual liberty. The growth in stalkerware seems to echo the increase in domestic abuse crimes across the UK since lockdown measures came into force.

How to prevent stalkerware if you think you are at risk:

1. Secure your phone against all unauthorised physical access by using two factor authentication such as a pin code, and a second form of identity confirmation such as an email backup or thumbprint.
2. Install a reliable anti-virus product on your mobile phone. A good mobile anti-virus will treat stalkerware as a PUP (potentially unwanted programme) and give you the option to remove it.

How to spot the signs:

- You notice your device's performance is suddenly and unexpectedly worse: you may notice slow-downs or more frequent crashes or freezes.
- Your settings have changed without your consent: if you suddenly have a new browser homepage, new icons on your desktop, a different default search engine, or other changes that you didn't make, it might be due to stalkerware.

- You get odd messages: a sudden flood of pop-ups or error messages from programmes that always worked fine before may indicate spyware.
- You have unexplained calls on your bill.

How to manually remove stalkerware from your phone:

- Reboot your phone into safe-mode: hold down your phone's power button to see your Power off and Restart options. Long-press the Power off option and the Reboot to safe-mode option will appear. Tap OK.
- Remove any suspicious apps: once rebooted in safe mode, open up your Settings and tap Apps or Apps & notifications. Sort through your apps and look for anything you don't recognise.
- Remove any Malicious Apps: tap Uninstall to remove them from your device. If you're not sure if an app is malicious, search for the name of the app on the internet to see if other people have shared issues with it.

County Council elections – will be held on 6th May. Ivan Ould, who has served as our County Councillor for the past 24 years, will not be standing for re-election. We thank Ivan for his regular attendance at PC meetings, and for his personal commitment to and strong support for democratic and accountable local government.

Finance - the Parish Council's accounts for 2020-21 have been finalised and details can be found on the PC's website (under Reports for next meeting until approved, and then under Finance). The accounts and supporting documentation will be made available for public inspection at 7 Main Street from Monday 14th June to Friday 23rd July inclusive.

Toddlers Play Area – extra play-bark has been laid by the Gardening Group to compensate for settlement.

Speed Indicator Device – is in storage as we are waiting for a renewed licence permitting deployment on street lighting columns.

White railings – along Congerstone Lane and around the Carlton Road/Congerstone Road junction have been repaired by County Council Highways.

Kissing gates – have been installed where footpaths leave Congerstone Road, Barton Road, and the A447, thanks to a grant from the County Council's Highways & Community Fund. The last gate listed was a joint installation with Nailstone Parish Council and means that footpath S47 from Harry's Grave to Nailstone is now completely stile-free.
