Building St Andrew's Community Hub

More great news! Building work started on the Community Hub on Saturday 19th June.

Bill Sharp, our PCC Chair, dug the first spade full, then our friends at AR Demolition took over and excavated for the foundations to the kitchen and toilet extension. Our sincere thanks once again to AR Demolition for their generous support to the project. An archaeologist from the University of Leicester kept a watching brief over the dig, though there was little evidence for him to examine.

An excellent turn out by members of the Carlton Gardening Group spread the excavated soil around the churchyard and footpath to even up some of the dips and hollows created over many years. The grass seed they spread around is already growing well.

Our builders, Ackroyd Construction, have now made the concrete foundations for the extension and have also started work inside the church. Many of the timbers from the wooden pew platform being replaced were completely rotten, so this work is very timely.

The next meeting of the Trustees of Carlton Charity Lands will take place on 17th November 2021. The Trustees can award grants of up to £200 and applications need to be received by 3rd November 2021. For an Application Form and further details please call 01455 290733, or email madrailfan@aol.com

We know it has been especially difficult for young people during the Covid pandemic and their education has been seriously disrupted. Maybe a grant from the Charity Lands would give someone a much deserved boost to the costs of their education or training. If you are, or you know of, a young person aged from 16 to 23 years, who is in, or planning to go into further or higher education, or training and would benefit from the Charity Lands' help then please encourage them to apply. Grants are made to help with the costs of apprenticeships, buying books, equipment, fees, travel costs and starting a business. Retrospective applications will be considered for expenditure that has been incurred since the Trustees' previous meeting, in this case, 18th November 2020.

Carlton Charity Lands distributes the annual rental income from two fields in the parish of Carlton in the form of financial assistance to young people at the early stages of their careers. Successful applicants must provide proof of purchase or costs incurred before monies are released. When an award is made, the applicant may not apply for another award until twelve months have elapsed from the date of the initial award. Please stay safe as life returns to nearer normal.

Rectors of Carlton

The ecclesiastical Parish of Carlton originated as a chapel of Market Bosworth. The earliest documentary record of a church here is as *capellam de Karleton* in 1220. The spiritual needs of Carlton would have been provided by a curate, employed by the Rector of Market Bosworth. In 1846 Carlton became a separate ecclesiastical parish with 43 acres and 36 poles of glebe, but with no rector or rectory.

The Rectors of Carlton were:

1868 Frederick Fowler Bradford appointed Rector of Carlton
(possibly as a temporary measure).

1869 - 1904 Rev William Townson (construction of the Rectory)

1904 - 1910 John Henry Townson

1910 - 1917 John Anderson Dougherty

1917 - 1928 Edwin Palin Herbert

1929 - 1939 Walter Ansell

1939 - 1951 Henry Edward Williams

In 1952, the Parish of Carlton was combined with the Parish of Nailstone, with the Rector living at Nailstone, and the Carlton Rectory was sold and became a private dwelling.

The names and dates above are from a detailed history prepared by Richard Liddington. The full text can be found in two articles: *Rectors of Carlton before the 20th century* and *Rectors of Carlton during the 20th century* under 'Carlton History', and then 'People and Memories' on the Carlton Parish Council website.

County Council elections - Bertie Harrison-Rushton was welcomed as our new County Councillor at the last meeting of the Parish Council, and can be contacted by telephone on 07506 075727, by letter to 17 Millstone Drive, Ashby de la Zouch, LE65 2AU or by email to Bertie.Harrison-Rushton@leics.gov.uk

Draft Local Plan 2020-39 - has been published for consultation until 27th August. Carlton will remain classified as a rural hamlet, and there are no major changes to the policies which directly affect Carlton. Housing allocations are not published in this draft; they will appear in the submission draft scheduled for publication in the winter of 2021/22, which will then be examined at a public inquiry in 2022. The Draft Local Plan and supporting documentation can be downloaded from the H&BBC website; the PC will submit formal comments in due course.

Parish Council's accounts - no objections were made to the accounts for 2020-21, and the audit is now complete.

Carlton Gate Information Board - is being made, and should be installed in the garden of The Gate Hangs Well in the autumn. One side of the Board will describe the history of this part of Carlton; the other will show the local footpath network and places within walking distance. This project has been supported by a 50% grant from the Borough Council's Parish & Community Initiative Fund.

Cemetery Paths - are set to be repaired and extended later this year.

Parliamentary Constituency - The boundaries of our constituency of Hinckley & Bosworth are to be re-drawn. The PC has objected to the initial proposals put forward by the Boundary Commission for England - details can be found on the BCE website at <https://www.bcereviews.org.uk/node/6483?postcode=CV130BZ>

Speed & Traffic Monitoring - Our speed indicator device (SID) monitored eastbound vehicles on Main Street between 25th May and 14th June. During this period 13,245 vehicles were counted: the average number was 667/day on weekdays, and 630/day over the week as a whole. The average speed was 21.5 mph and the 85th percentile speed 28.2 mph. The highest speed recorded was 50.0 mph at 04:50 hrs on 28th May. The SID was actually in place from 10th May, but there were a lot of storms between the 10th and the 25th which generated spurious readings so the data from this period were excluded from the analysis.
