A Woman With Altitude

In Carlton, Rosi Yule is known as the local Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator. What most will not know is that she is a very accomplished and skilled mountaineer!



On the 13th of September Rosi completed the challenge of climbing to the top of the highest points of all the 50 European countries. These 50 mountain summits varied massively from the very highest, Elbrus in Russia at 5642m (18,510ft—photo at left), to the very lowest summit at the Vatican City at 132m.

The challenge was carried out over numerous years and inspired by the publication titled 'Europe's High Point' by Carl McKeating & Rachel Crolla and was undertaken sometimes solo and sometimes with various companions, including her children Greg & Robbie and in recent years myself.

The challenges were extremely varied across the broad spectrum of summits, some mountain peaks required advanced mountaineering and rock-climbing skill sets, glacier navigation and crevasse techniques, whilst most involved high logistical planning, such as Sweden and Finland which are both hundreds of miles inside the Arctic circle, and most recently the Ukraine which required huge logistical planning.

Several summit adventures had to be curtailed and revisited, usually down to poor weather and deep snow! Iceland was a good example of this where we climbed up to the glacier at approx. 1400m to camp overnight only to be caught in 17 hours of snowstorm and woke to find our tent looking more like an igloo!

Rosi being a meticulous planner and organiser down to the very last detail would not have anything deter her from completing this unique and unusual challenge; she even completed the three Baltic high points with a broken leg in plaster! The cumulation of this challenge was on the 13th of September when the family gathered in Monaco for the final summit point at 162m, celebrated with a bottle of champagne.



Very well done to Rosi for completing her goal and now joining a very small and select group who have completed this challenge. To date, we believe that Rosi may be only the second British woman to have completed this.

Neighbourhood Watch

There were 7 reported crimes in Carlton in the 3 months June to August 2025. These were 2 violence and/or sexual assaults, 2 public order, 1 burglary and 2 other thefts. Market Bosworth Beat Team

Our local beat team has increased recently with the addition of PCSO Kate Needham to the Bosworth beat area. The team continues to patrol a large number of the local villages during the night, with stop checks conducted on vehicles and persons.

Recently a vehicle was stolen from Market Bosworth and another vehicle in the area had an attempted theft, but the perpetrators were disturbed. Fortunately, Carlton has little vehicle crime but the team would like to remind owners to ensure their car keys are not close to the front door and preferably in a Faraday pouch.

If you think you have received a scam email or text message, make sure you report it. You can forward emails to report@phishing.gov.uk, or forward spam text messages to 7726. This helps remove the scammers from circulation and maybe helps a more vulnerable person.

Beautiful Bandits Captured On Carlton Wildlife Camera

Polecats have been captured on a wildlife camera in the Carlton area! Their most distinctive feature is a 'bandit mask' across their eyes, which stands out against their paler cheek patches. They are often confused with ferrets and the polecat-ferret hybrid (hybrids usually have paler fur and less distinct facial markings). We think the Carlton polecats are true polecats, not hybrids, because of the dark strip of fur connecting the mask to the nose.

The little mustelids are a conservation success story. They used to be widespread, but they were persecuted during the 18th and 19th centuries and their range was restricted to mid-Wales, Herefordshire and Shropshire by the early 20th century. Today, they are making a comeback! Polecat presence can help other wildlife because of their taste for rats, reducing the number of



predators on eggs or chicks—so our polecats are cause for celebration! You can read more about Carlton's polecats here:

Diamond Jubilee Orchard – has been awarded a *Level 4, Thriving* certificate in the 2025 RHS *It's Your Neighbourhood* Scheme.

Defibrillator – an additional defibrillator has been installed at the Gate Hangs Well.

Dog fouling – new notices have been placed on local kissing gates.

Churchyard wall – the eastern section is gradually being pushed over – see *Report 2025-03* on the PC website. Plans are being drawn up to rebuild it.

Speed and traffic monitoring - the Speed Indicator Device (SID) was deployed at the western end of Main Street in July, checking the speed of westbound vehicles leaving the village. 15,507 vehicles were monitored, an average of 577/day with an average speed of 26.0mph and an 85th percentile speed of 32.1mph. Full details and charts can be found on the Traffic and Speed Monitoring page of the PC website.

Speed Indicator Device – the SID is currently mounted on street lighting columns and these have to be regularly tested which is expensive. The PC is planning to install permanent dedicated posts for the SID which will work out cheaper in the long run.

Main Street – the slippery road surface will be treated as soon as the weather is cool enough (horses have slipped over on the section near the church).

Main Street – the pavement opposite the church has been marked for repair.

Footpaths – timber sleeper bridges have been replaced on footpaths S68 and S69.

Ash Die-Back Disease – road-side ash trees in the Parish were re-surveyed in August. The disease is not spreading as fast as expected, and some trees previously assessed as infected appear to have recovered. In 2019, 59% of surveyed trees were assessed as healthy - this decreased to a minimum of 32% in 2022, and since then has increased to 42% in 2023, 45% in 2024 and 48% in 2025. The full survey can be found in *Report 2025-13* on the PC website.
